## Wilderness & Wildflower Walks, Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>

On Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>, Volunteer Naturalist Lance Hering will guide two Wilderness & Wildflower Walks in Lyman Woods. The walks will begin and end at the Lyman Woods Interpretive Center, 901 31<sup>st</sup> Street, Downers Grove, IL (just east of Highland Avenue).

There will be two walking groups, one starting at 9:30 AM, and the second group at 1:00 PM. Each walk will last about 1¾ hours.

The date was moved up a week this year in view of our mild winter and warm spring, a reminder that each year there is something different in the woods. Walkers are asked to be prepared for the weather of the day, and for wet ground along the paths.

Each group will be limited to about 12 participants. In order to take part in this special exploration of Lyman Woods, participants need to register in advance and are asked to make a \$25 donation to support the educational activities of Pierce Downer's Heritage Alliance (children under 13 free).

## Urban Forestry

Again in 2016, PDHA will be assisting the Downers Grove Public Works Department to identify locations suitable for new and replacement parkway trees. The Village has fully funded the 2016 tree-planting program, enabling up to 650 trees to be planted. Although full replacement of green ash trees lost to the emerald ash borer will not be possible for several years, the net loss of trees is much more modest thanks to the village's vigorous planting program.

PDHA will also be assisting in the community tree sale scheduled as part of the Public Works Department open house in May. Our participation will be in the form of publicizing the event and, as needed, contributing distribution workers. – By Chris Saricks

**Historic Preservation in Downers Grove**

The updated historic preservation ordinance that the Downers Grove Village Council unanimously adopted on December 15, 2015 is off to a good start. The first application under this greatly simplified ordinance was submitted by Amy and David Gassen for their 92-year old American Foursquare, Prairie Style home, located at 5320 Benton. Their landmark application first won approval by the Architectural Design Review Board (ADRB) at its meeting in February. The Gassens were then very pleased when the Downers Grove Village Council formally approved their landmark status by unanimous vote on March 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Amy Gassen, who is also a member of the Friends of the Edwards House historic preservation group, explained that the process was very simple and straightforward. She said they really enjoyed it. When asked why they landmarked their home Amy stated, "It's true that we wanted to protect our home, but a larger reason is to do our part to protect the history and character of our neighborhood and of Downers Grove."

Downers Grove Mayor Martin Tully presented the Gassens with their certificate of landmark status and expressed his sincere gratitude for their bringing this before the Council. Mayor Tully went on to say, "We have had for some time a strategic goal of being good stewards of economic, environmental and neighborhood sustainability within Downers Grove and a big part of that, as

discussed in last week's Annual Report and State of the Village Address, is preserving the rich history and heritage of our community in a way that protects private property rights."

## Historic Preservation (continued)

Following closely behind the Gassens are two other Downers Grove families who have submitted historic landmark applications to the Village, PDHA's Mark Bragen and Irene Hogstrom as well as Bo and Christine Martin. Mark and Irene's home is an 1891 era Folk Victorian house located at 1231 Gilbert Ave, while the Martin's home is a Queen Anne Style residence built in 1895 and is located at 701 Maple Avenue. Due to their interest in preserving historic homes, both families looked into landmarking under the old ordinance, but found the process cumbersome and confusing. Like the Gassens, both couples commented that applying for landmark status is now really easy. Their applications are to be reviewed on April 20<sup>th</sup> by the ADRB, meeting at 7:00 PM in Village Hall.

In addition to a greatly simplified application process, under the new streamlined historic preservation ordinance only exterior changes or modifications that require a building permit *and* are visible from the front facing street are required to obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness from the ADRB. Owners of landmarked homes are generally free to add on to the rear of their homes and make any changes they like to the interior without obtaining Village approval. Painting, pressure-washing, landscaping, and other projects that do not require a village permit may be carried out without ADRB review.

The new ordinance offers an innovative opportunity to create voluntary, non-contiguous thematic districts. This feature permits property owners of like style homes such as Foursquares, Victorians or kit homes like Sears to form a historic district even though their homes may be located throughout Downers Grove. Amy & David have expressed their intention to contact other Foursquare owners about forming a thematic historic district made up of Foursquare Style homes.

We congratulate Amy & David on approval of historic landmark status for their home and look

forward to quick approval of landmark status for the Bragen/Hogstrom home, the Martin home and many other fine historic homes to follow. – *By Rich Kulovany*

## Founders Day Activities

This year a full program of Founders Day events celebrating the history and heritage of Downers Grove spans two weekends.

Activities on Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>, include PDHA's [Wilderness and Wildflower Walks](#) in Lyman Woods, described in detail on the first page of this newsletter. In addition, at 11:00 AM, the 40th Annual Pine Hollow Open Golf Tournament, tees off at the Downers Grove Golf Club, 2420 Haddow Avenue.

Saturday, May 7<sup>th</sup> [Windy City Walkers](#) lead 5K and 10K walks through historic sites, including one of the largest concentrations of Sears Catalog Homes, the Historical Museum, a stop on the Underground Railroad and more. Walkers start out at 9:00 AM from Fischel Park, 1036 Grove Street. At 10:00 AM that morning, a [Family Bike Ride](#) sponsored by Downers Grove Bicycle Club also starts from Fishel Park.

Activities on May 7<sup>th</sup> continue with "[Country In The Park](#)," sponsored by The Grove Foundation and the Downers Grove Museum, from 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM in Wandschneider Park, 831 Maple Avenue. "Country in the Park" gives families a chance to visit with farm animals, view historic crafts like blacksmithing, candle and butter making, and wool-spinning demonstrations. They also learn how to play 1850-era games and enjoy a cool glass of lemonade.

## Why Beekeeping?

I am often asked why I would take up a hobby that entails working in the midst of thousands of buzzing bees, with the bulk of the work being done in the heat of the

summer. If I had to sum it up in one word it would be that it is fascinating! A few years back I took a beginning beekeeping class to see what it was all about. Before I knew it I was ordering bees and building my own hive, thinking it would be great to have one in my backyard and to harvest honey for myself, family and friends. Unless you are a beekeeper you may not understand the beekeeping fever many of us are prone to, but, by the end of my third season I had three dozen active hives!

There are many reasons that beekeeping can be such a fascinating hobby. It seems the more I learn about honeybees and how they function as social insects, the more intrigued I am with these small but very

important insects. It is amazing that they are responsible for pollinating about one-third of our food that sustains us. For that reason alone, I promote beekeeping, especially with the recent decline of honeybees and the challenges they face in this day and age. Of course, they also provide us with a most delicious product – honey!

Beekeeping is not a cut and dried hobby. There are many variables to contend with and many different methods of management to choose from. It is these challenges that drive me to put all the time and energy that I do into keeping bees. Then, of course, there's that zone you enter in the bee yard – that feeling of peace and contentment in the midst of busy bees flying around and crawling all over you!

With all this said, I feel very fortunate that beekeeping is now part of my regular duties as Naturalist here at Lyman Woods. Since we started the apiary with support from Pierce Downer's Heritage Alliance in Spring 2013, I have had the pleasure of teaching the **Junior Beekeepers Camp** and other activities. Now I look forward to our **Hands-On Mentoring** program April 23<sup>rd</sup> and then our **Honey Harvest** on July 23<sup>rd</sup>. If this bee talk has sparked your interest, “bee” on the look-out for other fun bee-related programs offered by the Downers Grove Park District at the Lyman Woods Interpretive Center.
